Despite the pandemic and technology challenges, AILDI presses on with its mission to preserve and promote Indigenous languages

November 10th, 2020

While National Native American History Month highlights Indigenous cultures every November, the **American Indian Language Development Institute**(AILDI) works year-round to preserve the languages at the heart of those cultures.

Alyce Sadongei, Project Coordinator for AILDI and a member of the Tohono O'odham and Kiowa nations, says the institute works with tribal leaders through workshops and training programs to help them move forward with efforts to improve technology access and use among Native American communities.

"So many people are using technology in language learning," Sadongei says. "Tribes are developing their own programs and computer games. They know that's where young people are, and they're going to have to meet them there."

Ofelia Zepeda, Regents Professor of Linguistics and Director of AILDI, says the pandemic has shined a spotlight on the challenge: "Like everyone else, we are trying to change with the times," Zepeda says. "We are looking more at applications of technology for language teaching and learning. We found out as we have all had to go online that there is still a divide for Native communities that have limited or poor access to the internet. So that move toward technology has been slowed."
